Info-gap theory is an approach that is designed for managing uncertainty in contexts such as force build-up, surveillance, and initiation of

An info-gap is the difference between what is known and what needs to be known in order to make a reliable and responsible decision

Presenter: Prof. Yakov Ben-Haim

Prof. Haim holds the Yitzhak Moda'i Chair in Technology and Economics, Technion, Israel. He initiated and developed info-gap theory, which has been applied extensively in many areas including security affairs. He is currently a Visiting Fellow at The Australian National University's Research School of Psychology
