### What are the steps?

Strategic Analysis

What is the *nature* of the problem?

What are my national interests?

What are the ends?

What is the intent, ways open & consequences?

What are the means to fulfil the ways?



## Strategic Analysis Tools

(SWOT each of these:)

- PMESII- DT (Political, Military, Economic, Social, Infrastructural, Informational Diplomatic, Time-related)
- DIME (diplomatic, Informational, Military, Economic)
- PESTLE (Political, Economic, Social, Technological, Legal, Environmental).



## Strategic Assessment

(for an emerging strategy:)

- Strong, clear purpose?
- *Nature* of the situation understood?
- Does it give: freedom of action, options, initiative, an advantage?
- One idea, or coherent chain?
- Does it guide sequence, timing, resources, priorities?
- Does it create cohesion?
- Is it feasible, sustainable, suitable, & acceptable?
- Does it commit the sin of being tactical?
- What are the consequences of this strategy?



## Changing Character of War

#### Modern Industrial War

- Definitive end
- Sustained high intensity
- Major powers technological supremacy
- Information operations to a well defined and identifying audience
- Primarily rural operations

#### Post Industrial War

- Unending, indistinct ending
- Episodic intensity
- Major powers technological superiority, but periodic parity
- Information operations to a global, critical and sceptical audience
- Urban and remote peripheries



## Changing Character of War

#### Post-Industrial Era

- Allegiance or identity to states
- Distinct ideologies, regionally defined

Human-speed decisions

• Emerging global surveillance

#### Informational Era

- Connected peoples
- Connected transnational ideas, mass appeal, shared globally ... re-emergence of old identities
- Accelerated decisions; integrated human-electronic interface
- Surveillance, extensive



# Changing Character of War

Transitional-Informational Era		Robotic-Synthetic Era		
•	Development of robotic systems (with errors & setbacks in use)	•	Self-manufactured, independent, remote and roaming weapon systems	
•	Development of new materials, and quantum technologies producing miniaturised weapons and surveillance tools, available instantly through 3D printing	•	Mobile production of materials for weapons, munitions and armour	
•	Medical advances especially in tackling industrial era diseases	•	Biological enhancements	
•	Cyber developments facilitating espionage, disruption and surprise	•	Code wars with greater effect; enhanced deception and stealth	
•	More urbanised conflicts	•	Environments of war shifting to urban, space and deep oceanic (sub-marine) but global 'strike anywhere' facility	





Peripheral Features of the First World War became 'conventional' issues by the mid-1920s:

Enlisting indigenous forces; operating in depth; pacifying or raising popular revolts; securing strategic resources and strategic locations; fulfilling alliance obligations...
